Glossary

Term	Definition
SLA	A Service Level Agreement (SLA) is part of a service contract where the level of service is formally defined. In practice, the term SLA is sometimes used to refer to the contracted delivery time (of the service) or performance.
OLR	Online registration form (OLR) is our online tool for registering your music.
CWR	Common Works Registration (CWR) is an internationally agreed format for the electronic registration and exchange of works information between publishers and societies.
Active work	All valid works registrations are automatically loaded to our copyright system. An active work is a work that is either due for licensing or has been used for broadcast, online exploitation or public performance. Many works registrations require no further intervention when they are matched to active usage or licences. However, sometimes there may be manual effort that is required to make the work ready for distribution or licensing This manual effort is governed by the published Active Works turnaround and processing targets.
IPC	The Independent Production Company scheme (IPC) is a licensing scheme for independent production companies primarily making content for Channel 4, Five and S4C.
